
Central Region*-- North Carolina 2003 Youth Tobacco Survey (YTS)

MIDDLE SCHOOL FACT SHEET



The North Carolina YTS includes data on the prevalence of cigarette and other tobacco products as well as information on tobacco use, environmental tobacco smoke (ETS), cessation, pro-health media, tobacco advertising, school tobacco prevention education, community participation, and access and availability of tobacco products. These areas are critical components that North Carolina should include in a comprehensive tobacco control program.

The North Carolina YTS was a public school-based survey of students in grades 6-12, conducted in 1999¹, 2001 & 2003. A multi-stage cluster sample design was used to produce representative data of middle and high school students for all of North Carolina. Schools were selected with the probability proportional to enrollment size. Classes were randomly selected and all students in selected classes were eligible to participate. The 2003 YTS central region middle school response rate was 97.3%, the student response rate was 75.5% and the overall response rate was 73.5%. A total of 947 central region middle school students participated in the North Carolina YTS in 2003.

Prevalence

36.7% of students had ever used any tobacco product (White = 33.5%, Black = 41.8%, Hispanic = 42.7%)² 28.2% of students had ever smoked cigarettes (Male = 28.7%, Female = 27.7%)

13.7% currently use any tobacco product (White = 13.1%, Black = 13.2%, Hispanic = 19.3%)

9.0% currently smoke cigarettes (Male = 9.7%, Female = 8.2%)

4.5% currently use smokeless tobacco (Male = 7.5%, Female = 1.5%)

Environmental Tobacco Smoke (ETS)

40.52% live in homes where others smoke 48.9% are in the same room as others who smoke during the week 62.27% think smoke from others is harmful to them

Cessation – Current Smokers

45.6% want to quit smoking 50.9% attempted to stop smoking in the past year

Pro-health Media vs Tobacco Advertising

81.4% saw or heard anti-smoking media messages in the past month 18.67% have an object with a tobacco brand logo

School

47.81% were taught the dangers of tobacco 2.5% smoked on school property in the past month

Community

19.6% participated in a community event to discourage tobacco use

Access and Availability- Current Smokers < 18 years old

5.5% buy cigarettes in stores

71.7% who bought cigarettes in a store were NOT refused purchase because of their age

Middle School Highlights

Nearly 4 in 10 students have used tobacco; 14% currently use some form of tobacco; 9% currently smoke cigarettes; 5% currently use smokeless tobacco (spit, dip or chew)

ETS exposure—nearly 5 in 10 students were in the same room with smokers during the past week

6 in 10 students think smoke from others is harmful to them

Nearly half of current smokers want to quit smoking

8 in 10 students saw anti-smoking media messages in the past month

Nearly half of students were taught the dangers of tobacco in the past year

Nearly 2 in 10 participated in a community event to discourage tobacco use in the past year

7 in 10 students were not refused the purchase of cigarettes due to age
